Austria 2007

At the beginning of the summer the hiking club ran a trip abroad for the second year running which has firmly made this an annual event after the enormous success of both this trip and our Pyrenees trip the previous year. In June 2007 we visited the small picturesque town of Hallstatt which lies in the heart of the Austrian lake district (the "Salzkammergut") where we camped for the duration of our trip.

During this amazing twelve day holiday we did some of the best walks I have ever done. A couple of the highlights were climbing to the top of Plassen, a mountain just under 2000 metres, and walking to the Simony Hütte which is a large manned hostel at the base of the glaciers coating the north face of the Hoher Dachstein – the main mountain range in the area. We also did some shorter but still truly beautiful walks in the surrounding valleys. My particular favourite was a walk to the glacier garden ("Gletschergarten"), an area of tremendous natural beauty with unusual rock formations carved out by glaciers and some truly breathtaking waterfalls.

We even had time for some sightseeing in-between walks which included venturing into a number of caves in the local area - including an ancient salt mine and an ice cave, we also found time to spend a night in the historic city of Salzburg.

However the most amazing part of this trip was the price. This trip was nearly two weeks long but due to some clever planning by our trip organiser Julia Summerfield, we were able to keep the cost to around £300 including food, cable cars and cave entrance fees. So what will we be doing for our summer 2008 trip...? Plans are still in the pipeline but look out for an email over the next couple of months for details.
